Key Information

Nightingales Projects:

We have some great enquiry projects this year in Nightingales. We are going to begin with an enquiry based our *Local Area*.

We will be going on adventure with our writing this year through Drawing Club. Children will be immersed in vocabulary and the joy of writing through drawing club, by going on an adventure with a book evert week and using this to inspire their own writing.



In maths, we begin the term by developing and building upon our place value skills. This includes sorting objects and representing numbers within ten. This will be taught practically using resources before moving onto pictorial representation.

Phonics:

At St Aldhelm's we use the Unlocking Letters and Sounds phonic scheme. Please see our class page for slides for how you can support your child at school.

Uniform

Please ensure that your child is wearing the appropriate clothing and footwear. It is also important that children have wellies and coats in school every day so that they can use all areas of the school, including the Forest School area.

For those children who have their ears pierced, it should be plain studs, which will need to be removed or covered with tape during PE. Other than a watch or medic alert bracelet, there should be no other jewellery / bands / accessories. Any child with longer hair needs to have their hair tied back. In addition to our standard school uniform, you may wish to provide your child with an oversized shirt to use as an Art apron. Please see the school website for a reminder on our uniform.

PE

For Autumn term, our PE sessions will take place on a **Tuesday** and **Friday**. Please ensure your child wears their PE kit in school on these days.

Meetings

It is important that there are strong communication links between us. Class Dojo messages, emails and messages through the School Office have been brilliant in helping us maintain those links. Although we will be able to see each other on the playground at the end of the school day, the use of Class Dojo messages and emails will continue to be our main forms of communication. This ensures that I can focus on making sure that children are released safely at the end of the day, as well as supporting children with this transition period. If you need to discuss any issues, concerns or general queries further, then I will be happy to arrange a phone call or meeting. If you are sharing information about attendance or something for that same day, please contact the School Office. This is because I may not always get the chance to check emails/messages before the end of the school day. Thank you for your understanding and I look forward to working with you throughout the year.

Behaviour

Behaviour expectations: Already this term, we have worked on remembering and re-establishing our school rules (Ready, Respectful and Safe) and learning behaviours (Belief, Aspiration and Advocacy). Children will continue to earn Class Dojo points when they are seen to be going above and beyond the standard expectations. This may be in pieces of work they produce; answers they give and how they conduct themselves around the school. Please do interact using Class Dojo, I know the children in previous years have enjoyed this function and have used it respectfully.

Home Learning:

It is important that children's learning habits get off to a good start. In school, we will establish and maintain a routine to meet all children's needs and promote curiosity, engagement and success. Key Stage 1 is an important stage in your child's primary journey and it is essential that children complete the home learning set. We understand that children have other commitments as well as a need to have time to switch off, which is why we continually review our home learning systems. It is important that children maintain regular practise of certain skills to help further develop their learning. Below is an overview of the expectations.

<p>Read and Respond (weekly)</p>	<p>Children should read their reading book to an adult at least four times per week. A record of this should be kept in their reading records. We then suggest children discuss what they have read and what has been read to them to give them the opportunity to respond to different texts. In addition, 'sharing' books will be sent home that can provide families with books for bedtime stories etc.</p>
<p>Spelling (weekly)</p>	<p>Spelling lists will be sent home each week. Spellings will match the graphemes and phonemes (letters and sounds) we have learnt in class. Children are expected to practise their spellings and letter formation.</p>
<p>Number Activity (weekly)</p>	<p>Children will be expected to complete 15 minutes across the week of a maths activity that is linked to our learning in class in Home Learning books.</p>
